It's My Park Day coming March 2nd

It's about to be the special time of year again when the showers come (we hope) and flowers bloom. That means it is also time for us to take care of the trees in Hemphill and Adams parks. We all get some benefit from the parks even if it is just enjoying the view when passing by. Most of us get far more with dog walks, games, or encounters with neighbors under the trees. Since we all benefit from having these open spaces nearby, it is important that we help keep them in good shape. We can do that by giving a few hours this coming March 2nd to help care for the Adams and Hemphill Park trees during It's My Park Day. For almost three years now young trees some of you helped plant have been becoming established in the parks but they still need a good spread of mulch this spring to help them retain moisture through the hot Austin summers. The older trees that provide cooling shade and scenery also need love and attention. They need the nutrients provided by mulching to keep them green and lush. Turning out on the day to help mulch the trees is a great way to meet the neighbors, get some fresh air and exercise and enjoy the Parks.

It's My Park Days occur twice each year for the NUNA neighborhood; for Adams / Hemphill parks on the first Saturdays in March and November, and for Sparky Park on the first Saturday in November. On those days, volunteers coordinate with two groups: the Austin Parks Foundation and the Urban-Forestry Group of the City of Austin

Parks and Recreation Department to arrange for projects to enhance and protect our parks. You can learn more about the two groups who help with our parks at their websites listed below.

You can participate by showing up on the day to help. Just visit the Austin Parks Foundation website at: austinparks.org sometime before the first Saturday in March. Events are sometimes slow to make it to the website, so if you don't see our parks listed, just keep checking back. During previous Park Days, registered volunteers have received T-shirts and goodie vouchers and this will likely be the case this year too. Local sponsors have also provided food and drinks in the past and will hopefully come through again this time. We can thank them by letting them know how much we appreciate their support.

Austin Creative Reuse visits NUNA

At our first general membership meeting of 2019, we invited a special guest, Karen Miller from Austin Creative Reuse, a local non-profit organization. She gave us an overview of their mission and it seems a lot of neighbors might be interested in donating items or some of their programming.

It was mind-blowing to learn how much material is diverted from landfills thanks to their efforts (their 2017 annual report cites 84,000 pounds - that's up from 38,000 pounds in 2016).

Many local artists use supplies from creative reuse. Before you send a household item to the recycle bin, consider donating it here instead. Items include:

- vintage paper and photos
- small toys
- office supplies
- acrylic and craft paint
- yarn and knitting supplies
- wine and champagne cork (we know there's plenty of those around NUNA).

They also offer a variety of programs for all ages throughout the year.

Fatal Bicycle Crash at UT

A tragic event occurring on UT campus recently that is leading to renewed calls for safer infrastructure. On Monday, January 28th. 39-year-old Anthony Diaz was struck by a CapMetro bus while on his bicycle while traveling on San Jacinto near 23rd Street. Diaz was riding home from work at FOX 7 downtown.

FOX 7 reported Tony was a Navy veteran and worked on the Armed Forces Network in Italy and San Diego. He attended the Defense Information School at Fort Meade and was an honors student at Austin Community College.

All traffic fatalities are troubling but particularly so in this case was that the cyclist was doing everything right, according to UTPD.

"He was following all the things that you would expect bicyclists to do. He was wearing a helmet, lights on the bicycle, both front facing light as well as a rear blinking red tail light were on the bicycle, that's what you would expect," said UTPD Chief David Carter.

This stretch of San Jacinto is one of the safest, most low-traffic corridors to get from UT to downtown. KXAN reports witnesses said the driver was acting strangely and talking to herself. CapMetro CEO Randy Clarke issued the following statement: "On behalf of the entire CapMetro family,



I would like to express our deepest condolences to the friends and family of Mr. Diaz during this difficult time. We will continue our internal investigation of the accident and are working cooperatively with law enforcement officials. As a cyclist, I feel very strongly about the importance of safety for cyclists and all roadway users. The 1,800 men and women of CapMetro consider safety our number one value and are committed to operating your community's public transportation system in a safe and courteous manner."

"For at least the past five years, UT's leadership has recognized that the current design of San Jacinto is inadequate. The university's Campus Master Plan, approved in 2013, calls for removing all parking on San Jacinto and installing a physically separated bike path. The City of Austin has likewise called for a safer design of this street. The city's 2014 Bicycle Master Plan envisions physically protected bike lanes on the whole length of San Jacinto. The stretch

north of MLK is intended to be part of a core network of facilities that are comfortable for people of all ages and abilities."

With Speedway having recently been redesigned to encourage pedestrian use over cyclists, San Jacinto is an even more important North-South corridor for cyclists, and here is hoping CapMetro, UT and the City address and perform necessary measures to prevent this from happening again.

East Side Cafe, an east side staple on Manor since 1988, closed its doors January 31st.



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


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
