EFFORTS CONTINUE TO BLOCK PLASMA CENTER RELOCATION

Since late March, the focus of the neighborhood association has been on the possible relocation of the Austin Plasma Center. Currently located at 2800 Guadalupe, the center made plans to move 3423 Gualdalupe (on the southeast corner of 35th and Guadalupe). Initially, the neighborhood association filed an appeal with the Board of Adjustment challenging the issuance of a building permit. On April 23 the city building inspector ordered work stopped.

The next step in this matter is a hearing before the Board of Adjustment to consider this appeal. This hearing will be held on Monday, June 12, at the City Council Chambers on 2nd St. at Guadalupe beginning at 5:30 p.m. The strategy of the neighborhood association at this point is twofold.

First, we need as many people possible to write letters to the Board of Adjustment. This is vital and the concerns that need to be addressed are obvious. The relocation would, of course, impact most greatly on the area immediatley around this site, from loitering to littering, and increased traffic, crime, and noise. Very simply these centers are largely and frequently visited by vagrants. The record of these facilities at various locations is proof of this. Certainly businesses in the area would be harshly affected and, in fact, many of them have joined in opposition.

At this location the plasma center would act not only as a single magnet, but given the location of another existing facility (on 29th St. east of Guadalupe) the impact would be far greater. Not only would foot traffic as well as loitering increase along Guadalupe, but also through Hemphill Park and into other portions of the neighborhood. In turn, this intrustion would lead to other problems.

Letters should be addressed to the Board of Adjustment, but since it is inappropriate to mail them to the Board, it is requested that you do the following: either mail or drop off your letter to Stella Nilsen, 207 W. 35th St., Austin, Texas 78705, or bring it with you to the neighborhood meeting on June 5. This matter will be the prime agenda topic at the meeting and further details will be presented.

The other part of the strategy is to pack the hearing with as many people from our neighborhood as possible. The presentation of the appeal is limited to just a few speakers and a short time, but the impact of a full house of concerned neighbors goes much further than you can imagine. Presence is the key. Since the exact time is unknown at this point,

this item will come up on the agendawe ask that you keep in touch with one of the officers of the neighborhood association for the schedule, as well as car pool arrangements.

Your help in this matter is quite critical and very much appreciated. Contact any of the officers of the neighborhood association for further details.



STREET LIGHTING PROJECT PROGRESSING

The rehabilitation of the street lighting in Hemphill Park and surrounding neighborhood areas is slowly, but surely, progressing. The first phase, involving the installation of new electrical conduit and lamp post foundations, was nearing completion as of last week. The remaining work will consist of installing wiring and, finally, placement of the lamp posts. This final work will take between two and three weeks to accomplish and should conclude in June.
