# Austin Hosts Dell Match Play

Interested in golf? Here's where to start!

Springtime is a great time for golf. Austin recently hosted the PGA Tour's Dell Match Play and I'm sure many of you caught the Masters on TV recently as well.

Austin is a great golf town with an excellent history, not to mention a ton of brainpower in the sport. And did you know that Harvey Penick, one of the most legendary teachers and authors in the game lived in our neighborhood when Hancock Golf Course was the original Austin Country Club? The country club moved to what is now Riverside Golf Course in the 1950s and then again to Westlake in the 1980s.

There is a lot to love about golf. It's a great way to get in your steps. Walk nine holes and you'll come pretty close to 10,000 steps right there. The municipal courses also allow dogs on a leash, so they get a workout too!

Golf can be an intimidating sport, but this is a pretty excellent town for beginners to try their hand at the game. I would start at a putting green at one of the municipal courses like Hancock or Lions. It's free and pressure-free for all ages. I take my daughter and she has a blast – at least until she discovers the bucket of sand by the tee box.

TopGolf, which opened a few years ago in the Domain, is another great way to take some swings in a relaxed environment. I tell people it has a bowling atmosphere. It's not cheap and it's often busy, but it's quite a scene. If you want a smaller crowd go during the day midweek.

There are many short courses in town you should try next. Jimmy Clay-Roy Kizer on the South Side has a great driving range and four-hole short course where you can practice all day for just a few bucks. Downtown, Butler Park Pitch 'n Putt has a great vibe with holes up to about 100 yards. You can BYOB and play in a group as large or small as you like!

Once you've done that, head to Hancock, a nine-hole course that is relatively short but longer than a par-3 course. It's been in pretty good shape this spring, and it's rare to play a golf course that dates back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century. My favorite hole is the elevated par-3 5<sup>th</sup> that plays over Waller Creek.

You can also check out the Harvey Penick Golf Campus on the east side, which has three practice holes along with a driving range and nine regulation-length holes. They also offer Footgolf.

Once you're ready for 18 holes, head to Lions Golf course in Old West Austin or go to Morris Williams. (Frankly, if you're not a golfer, you should still go to Lions and take a look around the property. It is a gorgeous piece of parkland that feels stuck in time.)

Need help getting started? The city offers clinics and lessons at many of their locations and Hancock has junior golf programs in the summer. I would personally recommend finding a group clinic as it's cheaper and more relaxed than a one-on-one session. Grey Rock Golf Club (which the city bought a few years ago) has co-ed, senior and Get Golf Ready programs.



# NUNA Home to Be Featured on 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Preservation Austin Homes Tour— April 27<sup>th</sup>

When you walk our neighborhood's streets, you'll notice that North University is lucky to be home to many of Austin's great intact Craftsman homes. 32<sup>nd</sup> & 33<sup>rd</sup> Streets and Wheeler Street have some of the most beautiful Craftsman homes in town, while other streets east of Speedway feature more modest, but still lovely versions of this classic American style.

The "Craftsman" style that emerged from The Arts and Crafts movement was an international trend in the decorative and fine arts that began in Britain and flourished in Europe and America between about 1880 and 1920.

Currently there is an exhibit at the Harry Ranson Center entitled *The Rise of Everyday Design: The Arts and Crafts Movement in Britain and America*—which runs through July 14<sup>th</sup>. It explores this movement in art, architecture and other ephemera with over 200 pieces on display. HRC is always free to the public.

In conjunction with this exhibit, Preservation
Austin's 27th Annual Homes Tour: The Art of
the Craftsman Style, celebrates seven stunning
Craftsman style homes in Austin's central
neighbohoods—including one of the "Twin Sisters"
at 3118 Wheeler Street in Aldridge Place. These
home's histories give a glimpse of Craftsman style
living in the early twentieth century.

Creative updates and additions show their seamless adaptation to modern life today. Harry Ransom Center members receive discount pricing. This year's tour takes place April 27th from 10AM-4PM. Tickets are available now at <u>preservationaustin.org</u>. Become a member and get discounted tickets.

# Another Successful It's My Park Day in the Books!


Thanks to everyone who came out on the first

### Goodbye to Local Restaurant


